

Dear Friends

Quite a lot has happened over these past fifteen months, and for many of us life has changed and or continues to be incredibly

challenging. As we look toward the prospect of resuming a more normal way of functioning day to day, may we be reminded that God has been journeying and continues to journey with us in different ways. I am sure that we can all testify

to God's gracious presence with and in us, even in the simplest but most profound ways.

I always enjoy returning to the story of the feeding of the 5000 (literally males) in Mark 6:30-44. This is a classic Bible story, familiar to many, but one which we may run the risk of taking for granted or overlook because of its familiarity. Jesus asked the disciples to see to the need of hunger that they had identified: you give them something to eat. When they shared the little that they had (five loves and two fish), everyone was able to eat until they were satisfied, and even had leftovers. This is certainly a miraculous provision from God! But we must take note that Jesus gave thanks for that provision even before it was seen with the natural eyes, and the disciples obeyed Jesus' instruction to share the little they had despite the impossible equation — five loves, two small fish and 5000 males. Matthew's Gospel further emphasizes this point by adding, besides women and children (Matthew 14:21). It is believed that the size of the crowd was amazing since the neighbouring towns of Capernaum and Bethsaida probably had a population of only 2,000 to 3,000.

John's Gospel also records this miraculous feeding. For John, the miracles of Jesus are signs of who Jesus is, and are used to flesh out Jesus' teachings. John says the people followed Jesus because he met their physical need. Mark tells us that all ate and were satisfied. However, in John 6:35 we encounter the first of the seven I am self-descriptions of Jesus — I am the bread of life, which suggests bread that is living and or bread that gives life. The true bread of God, Jesus says, is not a thing but a person, who comes from heaven to

give life to the world.

Bread is the staple food of millions of people across the world and is a basic daily requirement to satisfy hunger. This is how John's Gospel wants his readers to understand who Jesus is — not as an optional extra — but as the Bread of Life through and in whom our spiritual hunger can daily be satisfied. After eating the physical bread, the people will get hungry again since physical bread can only satisfy physical hunger. But Jesus the bread of God can satisfy spiritual hunger in the human heart.

Here are a few statistics for you according to Wycliffe Bible Translators. Millions of people still do not have a single verse of Scripture. The full Bible is now available in 704 different languages, giving 5.7 billion people access to Scripture in the language they understand best. The New Testament is available in another 1,551 languages, reaching another 815 million people. Selections and stories are available in a further 1,160 other languages, spoken by 458 million people. There are currently 3,945 languages with no Scripture — 167 million people, speaking 2,014 languages, still need translation work to begin. One in five people, speaking 6,656 languages, do not have a full Bible in their first language — and 2,731 languages in 167 countries have begun active translation or preparatory work.

I feel fortunate to have the Holy Bible in my possession and to be able to read its contents, to understand something of its overarching message of God's love and grace in Jesus Christ, and to be able to respond to its invitation to follow Christ, not just for the provision of physical needs (although God will provide for our physical needs), but more importantly because God's Son, Jesus Christ, is the bread of Life who can satisfy the deepest hunger of our souls.

Like the disciples in Mark's Gospel, Jesus Invites us, too, to trust in God's miraculous

provision. The five loaves and two small fish often reminds me of my small and insignificant talents and efforts, but the miracle of the feeding of the 5000 plus encourages me to trust that God can take the small things that I have and use them in meaningful ways. No doubt many of you may be wondering what you can offer after COVID-19. As individuals, our efforts and talents may be only a little thing, but by joining our various talents and efforts together, we can achieve something far greater and bigger to God's glory. When each of us shares the little that we have, it can witness to others for them to do likewise!

Trinity Methodist Church Church Council Meeting on 23rd June 2021

The meeting was held on Zoom, and 13 members of Church Council attended. Rev'd Audrey Browne opened the meeting with devotions, then welcomed everyone and thanked them for attending.

David Gunton presented his detailed spreadsheet with full finance information and reported that the church is operating generally as expected when checking against the budget. Expenditure on maintenance is about level with budget: despite having replaced the boiler in the basement, we have carried out minimal other maintenance.

A report for the Charities Commission has been worked on by David Gunton, Barbara Johnson and Diane Bath. The report was approved by the meeting and requires signature before being submitted by the end of this month.

Tony Pitt reported that since the last Church Council meeting very little has happened in regard to premises. The church laptop has now been fixed, dealing with problems which had been arising during services.

A major theme for the rest of the meeting is a loss of people from many of our church posts.

Sue Doust has, for many years, been managing bookings and parking permits on church premises, but she needs to step down from this role because of eyesight problems. Thanks were expressed to Sue for all her hard work over these years. This is an important job, and a new person will be needed to continue Sue's work.

Diane Bath, our Senior Steward, reported that Judith Blackburn has decided to step down, as her working hours make it difficult for her to continue. Edna, Jenny and Katrina are at the end of their normal service terms as stewards, but all three have said they are willing to continue on a temporary basis. Katrina will continue for now – until Julian is able to return to church services – at which point she would be bringing him to church so would be unable to fulfil her stewarding duties.

Heather is the only remaining head of a house group; all the other groups – Trinity Fellowship, Eastrop House Group and Northern House Group – are without a leader.

We have been unable to hold a General Church Meeting because of Covid restrictions, so it was agreed that for now we shall continue with those people who are already in place.

We are hoping that the Admin Office will be open again in September, but on just two days a week because few people are available. Anyone wanting to offer to help should contact Pauline. Thanks to Diane, Pauline, Sonia, David and Edna for all their work in running the church office.

Mission Action Plan: This is a major project, looking at how we can work to move the church forward. Barbara Johnson has done excellent work on this with Jennifer Pitt and David Gunton, dividing the questions into four groups. The meeting approved a

suggestion that at this stage we concentrate on one area and do it well, rather than work on all four groups at once.

Audrey suggested that the Mission Action Plan could be introduced at one of her services at Trinity. The theme should be 'Taking Responsibility', giving a reminder and encouragement for the four areas of our MAP, as we need the commitment of our congregation. A meeting could then be held at some point, open to all members of the congregation, to decide to concentrate on one simple thing in each of the four groups; we need all our people to be a part of the conversation.

For now, various things are already planned for the future: JAM will be meeting on July 4th, and Trinity Circle and Heart & Soul are continuing.

Peter Ansell said that as Trinity moves towards being a Bronze Level Eco Church, he and Tony Pitt will be introducing a lifestyle questionnaire for everyone to complete.

The process of the GILUU (God In Love Unites Us) consultations has now come to an end, and a decision will be taken on this matter at a Conference very soon. Church Councils will be told in due course what decision is required of them, and the timeline for any such decision. The wider congregation would then hear about what the Conference might ask churches to do.

The date of the next Church Council meeting was set for Thursday 7 October at 7 pm.



Revd Dr Tracey Darling's Ordination

On Sunday 27th June, Tracey Darling took the final step in becoming a Minister. In the morning, she was "received into full connexion", and then in the afternoon she was ordained at Coventry Central Hall. Being "received into full connexion" is the moment when conference accepts the ordinands to take their place alongside all existing Ministers, representing a relationship of mutual obligation between the individual and Conference. Through the laying on of hands in the Ordination Service, Tracey has been commissioned to the work of a Minister.

We were privileged to be able to take part in Tracey's Ordination Service. It was, we believe, rather different from such services in previous years, because of Covid-19 restrictions. Chairs were spaced out, there was very limited room for guests, and, worst of all for a Methodist event, there were no refreshments provided afterwards. Nevertheless, it was a very moving service, led by the President of Conference, Rev^d Sonia M Hicks. Rev^d Lionel Osborn, a past President, delivered the sermon, picking up three words from the readings – Surprise, Grace and Gift – and relating them to the individuals. Later in the service, we received Holy Communion with Tracey and her family.

That service marked an important step in Tracey's journey, and we wish her every blessing as she fulfils the calling she has answered.

To make up for there being no refreshments provided, Tracey's guests were able to share a drink and cake outside afterwards, which gave us an opportunity to chat. Some of us also met up with old friends who were there as well.

Alison Margaret Parker: Born in Lewisham Hospital on 16 December 1959. Alison's mother died when Alison was seven weeks old. Her father married Alison's godmother, her mother's best friend. Alison was devoted to her younger brother and sisters, and both her parents. This stable home enabled her to embrace leaving to attend Durham University where she read maths and computing. At Methsoc she met Michael. Upon graduating she worked at Sainsbury's head office in London. Alison and Michael married on 4 April 1983. In 1994 they moved to Basingstoke, now with daughter Emma and son Christopher. Alison once again picked up Local Preaching which she had begun before University. She also became more involved with the local church. Leading a service following 9/11, Alison felt the strong call to ordained ministry. She trained on the STETS course in Salisbury. Through the opportunities created by the course, and diversity of students, Alison not only made long-standing friends but came to live on a larger church and spiritual map, resulting in a rich and eclectic spiritual life. Alison had a growing hunger for God. She served all her presbyteral ministry in Basingstoke, later to be Basingstoke and Reading Circuit. Alison's church work but not her ministry stopped when Christopher was seriously injured in a near fatal car accident. During this time Alison dug deeply into relationships, family, friends and with God. All these, sown deeply, then grew into flourishing life-giving relationships over the coming years. She relished being with people, in person and, later, online. Her love of God and people was an infectious and attractive combination. Leading worship and enabling people to pray were great joys for her, and her ministry with the bereaved was especially appreciated. She sat down in September 2020 to give more time to her family and particularly to young grandson Leo. Alison's sudden death stunned many. Her life and ministry has enriched many. She is survived by Michael, Emma, Christopher and Leo. Alison died on 19 January 2021, in the sixty-second year of her age and the fourteenth year of her presbyteral ministry.

The Hummingbird and the Forest Fire

An enormous fire starts to rage through a forest. All the animals flee to the forest edge to watch — all, that is, except for a tiny hummingbird. 'I will do something about this fire', says the tiny bird. So it flies to the nearest stream and dives beneath the surface. Rising into the air, it carried a bead of water in its beak that it releases over the flames. The fire is huge, but over and over the hummingbird flies to the stream, turns with a drop in its beak, and lets it fall onto the flames. Each time, the bird believes that this one drop might make the difference.

The other animals – some with large trunks and large mouths like the elephant, giraffe, lion and leopard – laugh at the diminutive creature. 'What do you think you're doing?' they jeer. 'You're only a hummingbird. You can see how big the forest fire is. Do you think you're going to do any good at all?' Without wasting any time and tired of their discouraging words and inaction, the hummingbird turns to the other animals as it prepares to fly back to the river, and says 'Well I'm doing the best I can!'

Relating this to the climate emergency, none of us can solve the crisis as individuals, but we can all do a little bit and together we can make a big difference. In my sermon at Trinity on 9th May, I suggested the following things that people might do:

- Pray for those involved in the COP26 meeting in Glasgow this autumn, that world leaders might take bold decisions to address the climate emergency.
- Make a small change to your diet, to reduce the amount of meat (particularly beef) and dairy produce you consume.
- Use your car less; switch to a smaller car, or an electric car.
- Replace light bulbs with modern, efficient LED ones.
- Turn the thermostat down a degree, but not so far that you get ill from the cold.
- Switch to an electricity provider with a "green tariff", or one that is wholly green.
- Switch off lights in rooms that are not in use.
- Don't over-fill the kettle when boiling water.
- Recycle everything that you can. (Remember, Trinity is collecting empty blister packs from tablets.)
- Support charities that are addressing the climate emergency.
- Buy local rather than imported goods.

None of us will do all these things. Each of us, however, can make a small change to reduce our impact on the environment, and when added up that will contribute to the big changes that are needed.

Currently we are collecting the following:

- Biscuit wrappers, both sweet and savoury varieties and cake wrappers. However, no sweet wrappers such as Mars, chocolate bars etc. It can be confusing as some biscuits such as Kit-Kat and Twix are often found with the sweets but are in fact classed as biscuits as they have a biscuit base.
- Baby food pouches and kids' yoghurt pouches as well as Ella's Kitchen snack wrappers. No other yoghurt pots are collected.
- Crisps of all varieties and any brand like Skips, Hoops, Wotsits, Doritos etc. We cannot collect peanuts, popcorn or pretzels though.
- Air, Home & Laundry care packaging. We could do with more of this. It includes
 the flexible packaging from dishwasher and detergent capsules / tablets; all brands
 of plastic air freshener containers, cartridge tops and car fresheners (but not
 electric plug-ins); flexible wipe packaging and tinted tubs for wipes used in home
 cleaning. (No baby wipes or cosmetic / facial wipes); tinted fabric conditioner
 bottles and their caps; Lenor tumble dryer sheets but not the box they come in.

All the recycling gets sent off in separate boxes according to type. Therefore, it is exceedingly helpful for when I come to sort it if all wrappers are put in *flat and unfolded* unless they are the big multi-pack wrappers. Sometimes wrappers have been folded into tiny triangles or tied into tight knots. This may save space in the bin but sadly they usually get discarded as trying to undo them is very time-consuming. Even screwed up packaging can take extra time to flatten. Fortunately, there is not much after sorting that I have to discard. I have some unusual deposits of cat food pouches, noodles and pasty / pie wrappers and Muller yoghurt wrappers fairly regularly but small in number compared to the rest of the recycling! If you hear of anyone who thinks we recycle those sort of items, do please set them straight.

In the last 12 months we have redeemed £110 from our collection which goes to Future Pillars for their work with vulnerable girls in Zambia. Do keep collecting.

Woodlarks

It is just a wooden ornament, a camel. It was on a windowsill standing erect, and intact. For me, it is a remembrance of a holiday in the Holy Land. Unfortunately, a flick of a curtain, and it laid on the floor, minus two legs. This was not the first time one leg had been broken, but this time two, both on the same side of the camel.

Once again, out came the strong glue repairing one leg. I still haven't found the other one. The glue has worked, and the camel stands again, on three legs, and half of the fourth. This happening has made me think, and remember a place called 'Woodlarks.'

'Woodlarks' is in Farnham, Surrey. Part of the site is a camping ground for the disabled. It is complete with swimming pool and huts, where people with disabilities can enjoy the outdoors, in the same way as able-bodied people.

Many years ago, my husband volunteered to assist at a camp for disabled Scouts. He was Scout Leader at Trinity, for the 1st Basingstoke (Methodist) Scouts.

I was going through a 'Woe is me' period in my life. My sons were growing up with their own interests, and I was alone at home. The telephone call invited me to the Camp Fire at Woodlarks. What I saw there made me ashamed.

Those lads were the most courageous people I have ever met.

Let me, introduce you to two of them. He was a young teenager, running through the bushes to retrieve a ball in a rounders game. He ran on stumps. He had lost both legs in a freak accident. 'Guess how tall I will be' he shouted to me. 'I am going to get new legs soon.'

Another younger boy put his arms around my neck and told me he loved me. I was helping him into his pyjamas, ready for bed. He had spina bifida.

There were also those with loss of limbs, and the boy my husband helped, on a one-to-one basis, who had muscular dystrophy. All of these wonderful young people were happy and laughing. I changed that day, losing my self-pity and being more positive.

For lots of us the present pandemic has changed our lives. We have missed seeing our families and friends, and we have had to do things differently.

Can we go back to our former selves? Possibly, but should we?

The camel stands on three legs. To me, it is a symbol. I can stand too.

Paul writes to the Philippians in Chapter 4. 'I can do all things in Christ who strengthens me".



Eco Church - Good News Story from Mortimer:

Fluorescent Tube to LED Tube (retro fit). Here at Mortimer we elected to become an Eco Church at our Church Council earlier this year. One particular thing we looked at was our lighting and energy consumption. Here at Mortimer we have 35 Fluorescent tubes throughout the facilities. There is an online calculation which you can search for to calculate energy usage. In this you just list all the light fittings and the hours used. It is simple to use and this calculates the energy used and the returns. The return for the Hall converting to LED Tubes was break even in less than 2 years.

There are 2 types of Fluorescent fittings, one is Electronic Ballast and the other Magnetic Ballast. To check which you have is simple. Use your mobile phone camera and hold very close to the tube, a few inches, if you see wavy lines, then it's a Magnetic Ballast. This is the most simple of tasks and is DIY.

The Electronic Fluorescent fittings will require a qualified electrician in to modify. Fortunately all Mortimer's fitting were magnetic. The LED tubes are in 3 radiant flavours, Warm White, Cool White & Daylight. We opted for Daylight and the difference is astounding. *Advantages:*

- Low Wattage: 32w
- No drop in light output over time
- No flicker
- No UV output / Mercury Free
- Energy Saving up to 60%
- Easy to install
- Quiet
- Long life
- Cost effective (LED Tubes same cost as conventional tubes)

I managed to get the LED Tubes through TLC Electrical and also a nice discount for the church:

In the last three months Chaplains walking around town have met people wanting to chat to someone or talk about health and relationships and issues around security: a job, home or money. We have been able to engage with people in the name of Jesus; we do not know where these encounters will lead but the Holy Spirit can speak into people's lives.

We have started visiting shops again. Personnel have changed considerably, so there is an opportunity to start again and build new relationships. But familiar faces remain and on many occasions Chaplains have been told how much they have been missed. Several people have asked for a private conversation, as pressures have built up over the last year and there is now an opportunity to unburden safely to someone. Once there is mutual understanding and trust, many people feel able to tell a Chaplain about challenging things in their life.

We will resume attending the Magistrates' Court in July, where we have been missed. Staff can find the situations they are put in to be highly stressful, and attendees are often worried, frightened and regretful. A word in season can be a great blessing and pointer to a forgiving God who loves them for the better, not a vengeful power over them.

Amid all the conversations Chaplains have with people, God is at work and we pray that others will be drawn into living for God, knowing His salvation and love. Hopefully, we can begin to show the way for someone to have a personal relationship with Christ which a local church can continue to nurture.

Along with prayer, we would greatly value more people considering becoming Chaplains. We offer a session walking round with a Chaplain to see how we work and are looking for people to give 2 hours a week in one of several slightly different roles, whichever suits the person best. We provide a uniform, full training and support. As more activities are allowed to re-start, we pray that you will be blessed with friendships and renewed fellowship and that you also will be a blessing to others.

What will You Miss about lockdown?

More than half of us admit that we will miss some aspects of the Covid-19 restrictions, especially spending more time at home with our family, and appreciating the quieter roads. A recent study by King's College London and Ipsos Mori found that around one third of us feel the past year has been similar or better than normal, while 54 per cent of us say that we will miss some of the changes. Three in ten of us feel closer to our immediate family than we did before the pandemic, while just one in six of us say that we have grown further apart. One in five of us say that our finances are better because of the pandemic. Overall, it seems that while the public would rather the pandemic hadn't happened, that doesn't mean it's been all bad for everyone, or that people see it as deeply affecting their future lives.

We are back on the streets of Basingstoke!

It has been a long 15 months for Street Pastors since the first COVID lockdown brought patrols to an end. However we are pleased to announce that we have been able to send out teams for the last 5 Saturday evenings because of easing of restrictions. As expected, the streets and venues have been much quieter than before the pandemic.



This is largely because the rule of 6 inside and 30 outside mean that the pubs and restaurants are operating on greatly reduced capacity and the night clubs are not yet reopened.

Despite that, each evening, we have found people in need of our help and support. You can read some of our experiences in the Stories from the Streets section of the newsletter.

Like many we are disappointed that the final phase of easing restrictions that we were hoping would be announced this week has been delayed for 4 more weeks. However, we understand the fragility of the situation and the need for significantly more people to be vaccinated so support that decision. We hope to resume Friday evening patrols soon.

Stories from the Streets

Here is a report from one of our recent Saturday evening patrols.

"We had a good evening chatting to door staff, business owners, police and PCSOs, all of whom were extremely pleased to see us back out on patrol. Evening was mostly quiet. There was a large group of teenagers who were being unruly with a shopping trolley at the top of the town. We engaged a number of these in conversation and gave them lollies

which proved popular. The CCTV control team called the police to remove the trolley before it became an incident.

Later we came across a young lady at The Angel who had been abandoned by her friend. She was upset and did not know how to find her way back to the station. We offered to help her on her way, but she managed to speak to someone on the phone and said she knew where she was going. We followed at a distance, and it soon became clear that she had only a vague idea of where she was going so we made contact again and walked with her to the station. She was much happier when we left her to catch her train to Reading.

Coming out of the station we came across another young woman who had cut her foot running for her train which she missed. We provided her with some wipes and water to clean her foot and gave her a pair of flip flops. A group of lads were hovering around her, flirting with her in a good-natured way. We stayed around while she waited for her male friend returned from buying a kebab in case matters took a negative turn. All was fine and the two of them went off to catch a train.

On returning to the centre of town we came across a young lady who had fallen and banged her head. It turned out that she knew one of our Street Pastors from growing up in church. She seemed fine and had no visible injuries and went off with her friends.



Soon after that a group of about 10 youths ran down Wote Street towards the cinema complex, shortly followed by another similar group. We alerted CCTV in case an incident developed and prayed for peace after which things quietened down."

As well as volunteers to go out on the street as Street Pastors, we also have vacancies for people willing to be Prayer Pastors and pray for us while we patrol. Street Pastors and Prayer Pastors connect at the start of the evening to pray using a WhatsApp video call. Then during the evening, the team will send in updates and prayer requests for the Prayer Pastor.

Canon Paul Hardingham Considers the Need for Encouragement

Olympic Gold

This month should see the start of the Tokyo Olympics, having been postponed from last year due to the Coronavirus pandemic. A number of New Testament letters refer to Olympic sport including Hebrews: 'Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith' (Hebrews 12:1-2).

The Christian life is compared to a long-distance race, but despite the struggles and obstacles, there is a great crowd of witnesses cheering us on. We have a heavenly Father who loves us and a Saviour who has run the race before us. If we keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, He will enable us to finish the race. During the 1992 Barcelona Olympics, the British athlete Derek Redmond was running in the semi-finals of the 400 metres. About 250 metres from the finish his hamstring tore. He fell to the ground in pain and stretcher bearers came over to him. However, Redmond was determined to finish the race and so he started hopping toward the finishing line. Suddenly Jim Redmond, Derek's father, ran out of the stands towards him. "You don't have to do this," he told his son. "Yes, I do," said Derek, to which his father said, "We're going to finish this together." They completed the lap with Derek leaning on his father's shoulder. As they crossed the finish line, the spectators rose to give Derek a standing ovation. Although he didn't win an Olympic medal, Derek Redmond finished the race with his father at his side. Canon Paul Hardingham Considers our Call to Befriend People in Need

The Good Samaritan

This month we are looking at the Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37). This familiar story tells of a man who is mugged on the road between Jerusalem and Jericho and rescued by a Samaritan. Jesus tells it in response to a lawyer's question, "What



must I do to inherit eternal life?" When Jesus calls for a life of total love towards God and neighbour, the lawyer comes back with the question: 'who is my neighbour?' (29).

The plight of the man and the indifference of the priest and Levite would have horrified Jesus' hearers. They assumed that the hero of the story would be a Jew! However, Jesus presents the Samaritan, a sworn enemy of the Jews, as a model of integrity and an example to follow: "Which of these three do you think was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?...Go and do likewise." (36,7). The challenge of the story is that often our neighbours can be our worst enemies, yet these are the very people we are called to love as ourselves.

Of course, we can all think of people to whom we are called to be a Samaritan in our lives: those we try to avoid and don't want to get alongside. If we are honest, we know that we don't have it in us to love as Jesus says here. We all need somebody who will be our Good Samaritan, to rescue us and enable us to love others as ourselves. Jesus is that Good Samaritan for us. "By depicting a Samaritan helping a Jew, Jesus could not have found a more forceful way to say that anyone at all in need – regardless of race, politics, class, and religion – is your neighbour." (Tim Keller).

HYMN: The story behind - 'Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken'

(the first 2 verses are shown)

Glorious things of thee are spoken,
Zion, city of our God;
He whose word cannot be broken
Formed thee for His own abode.
On the rock of ages founded,
What can shake thy sure repose?
With salvation's walls surrounded,
Thou may'st smile at all thy foes.

See, the streams of living waters,
Springing from eternal love,
Well supply thy sons and daughters,
And all fear of want remove.
Who can faint while such a river
Ever flows their thirst to assuage:
Grace, which like the Lord the giver,
Never fails from age to age?...

The year was 1800, and Vienna was under bombardment by Napoleon's troops. The great Austrian composer, Haydn, then old and frail, asked to be carried to his piano. There he made his own defiance of Napoleon, by solemnly playing through his composition 'Emperor's Hymn'. Haydn had composed it for the Austrian Emperor, Franz II's birthday on 12 February 1797. Haydn never touched his piano again, and died a few days later, aged 77.

That is where the tune for this well-loved hymn came from. It quickly became the tune of the Austrian national anthem. It was later even adopted by the Germans, as the tune for August Heinrich Hoffman von Fallersleben's (1798 – 1874) anthem Deutschlandslied, which began with the famous words: 'Deutschland uber alles' (Germany before everything). In the ensuing political upheavals, the tune survived in the German national anthem, but was abandoned by the Austrians in 1946.

In the meantime, the tune had also reached England, as early as 1805. It was then that the words of a hymn by John Newton were first paired up with it. This meant that when the Austrian Emperor Franz visited his grandmother Queen Victoria, at Windsor Castle, he most likely would have sung his own national anthem tune to English words written by a converted slave trader turned country vicar!

John Newton's inspiration for this hymn comes from Psalm 87: 'Glorious things are spoken of you, O City of God' (vs3) and also a text from Isaiah 33:20-21: 'Look on Zion... there the Lord in majesty will be for us a place of broad rivers and streams...'

John Newton's hymn celebrates the joy of knowing that the Church is the new Jerusalem (Zion) where God abides. He rejoices that God protects His people and promises to supply their needs. He leads them into the Promised Land, just as long ago He led the Israelites through the wilderness to their Promised Land. Back then, He led them with a fiery and cloudy pillar; now we have His very Spirit within us, to guide us each step of the way home. (*Parish Pump*)

The anointing of God's Holy Spirit was central to the Coronation and, in preparation for the day, The Queen prayed: 'Come, Holy Spirit, and daily increase in all of us, and in me, thy humble servant, thy manifold gifts of grace; the spirit of wisdom and understanding; the spirit of counsel and strength; the spirit of knowledge and true godliness, and fill us, O Lord, with the Spirit of thy holy fear, now and forever. Amen.' The beautifully illustrated souvenir book to be published for the celebrations uses rarely seen prayers, which the Queen prayed in preparation for the Coronation, and highlights how God has answered those prayers over the past seven decades.

The 'Platinum Jubilee Celebration of Faith and Service' will build on the successful partnership facilitated by HOPE Together, which enabled local churches to bring their communities together for the Diamond Jubilee and the Queen's 90th birthday celebrations.


Over the next year HOPE will provide churches across the country with all the resources and ideas they need to run a great all-age community event that will celebrate the Queen's 70 years of faith and service.
