



#### **Dear Friends**

On 31st of July friends gathered at two separate tea-time events celebrating (in Steeple Claydon) the life of John Jones and (in Basingstoke) Pam and Lynden Jones, who were all lost to our fellowship during the Pandemic. These important events are not only a time to celebrate and mourn friends we have lost, but also a chance to be grateful for their example and to cement the links with their families and others in our circle.

During the afternoon in Basingstoke, a conversation with John and Joan Rowland revealed that John was about to preach his last sermon. John had already decided that he was going to focus on Moses and preach from Deuteronomy, but he wasn't quite sure at the time what he was going to say. I was intrigued and asked if I could have a copy of the sermon, even though John usually preaches without notes. The following is the text of John's sermon, preached at a communion service in Kennington on August 15th where he was assisted by Paul Rosentall.

The Old Testament Reading, Deuteronomy Chapter 34, verses 1-6 is entitled: "The death of Moses."

God allowed Moses to see the promised land from the top of Mount Nebo and in verse 5 God tells him; "This is the land that I promised Abraham, Isaac and Jacob I would give to their descendants. I have let you see it, but you will not go there".

I have always thought that it was a bit mean that Moses couldn't go any further but as President Kennedy said "the torch (and the responsibility) had passed to a new generation." **Hilary** 

## The following is the text and the wisdom of John's sermon:

"But Moses got the people there. He got this argumentative, querulous, complaining people

to the very edge of the promised land. They could see beneath them, the River Jordan and beyond it, that for which they longed and God had promised. This man, by patience, determination, refusal to accept anything less than the best, this Moses had got them there. Moses, who had been abandoned to a rush basket in the river, shepherded sheep, seen for the first time the truth that there was one God, led his troublesome and almost never satisfied people out of slavery, kept them going in the wilderness for who knows how long, brought water from the rock, besought manna from heaven, stood between and for God and the people this Moses had got them there.

Here they were at the edge of the promised land and they owed it to him.

There are, were, folk to whom we owe so much. Some in my life without whom I don't know where or what I would have been. I could name them, but that would mean nothing to you.

What about you? Forget the religious aspect for the moment - we'll return to that. I am speaking of those whose compassion, support, encouragement, reproof, love for us, and example, helped us along the way. They who were patient with us when we were insufferable. believed in us when perhaps we didn't even believe in ourselves, tolerated our mistakes, encouraged the best in us, loved us even when they saw and felt the worst that was in us. People who, looking back, helped us get this far along and without whom we would have been less than we are? I'm asking you to call them to mind, say their names to yourself, see again their faces and give thanks for them. "In everything" says St Paul "In everything give thanks" That is the heart of Christianity.

Then there is our place within the Christian tradition. I could name others, a handful, but what a precious handful, who by simply being who they were, kept me in the faith. It was not what they said or did, but

simply who they were, what they were. When I question how much a Christian I am, and think why does this matter, what difference does this make to me or through me, what holds my faltering or inconstant grasp? It is this: if this one or that one held to the story, the experience of Christ and His cross, lived by that truth that they had come to and held to, then that outweighs all else. I look at them and think, once more, what they had, what they have, I must be part of it. If they were wrong, I would rather be wrong with them than anywhere else.

Who helped you along towards the promised land simply by being who they were? Give thanks for them. Say their names and see again their faces. And, if they have gone before you – as almost all of mine have – they are still and forever holding us up. We are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses.... and among them those whose very being brought us thus far.

What is left for people who have come to the very edge of promise? What was left for the Israelites was to cross over the River Jordan into that land.....without Moses. He who had carried them, led them, dragged them, driven them, could not take them across that river. They must do that for themselves. Now they would discover whether what he had held to, what had held him, what they had trusted and followed, because he trusted and followed it whether it was true, whether it was real, whether it was more than a hope. We too come to the edge of the promised land. There beyond all else, we need trust in what we have seen and admired and clung to, in those we have remembered. Those who lit up the way; those whose very being left us knowing that we must be in no company but theirs.

We too will come to the edge, where there is one last river to cross. On the far bank stand those who brought us thus far. Among them One, who, so they believed, and so – with them – we believe, makes that promise a reality.

They and He will have brought us through it all to the very edge of the Promised Land. For

those who have brought us thus far, for them we give thanks – those witnesses who, as Issac Watts' hymns show, the way to heaven and shall we not, once more trust them all in that last great adventure?

### Conference 2021 – 39/3. Holy Communion and Online Worship

Abridged Guidance for our Zoom audience full participation

Dear Friends,

The Conference adopts a period of discernment from 1 September 2021 until 31 August 2024, in which presbyters and other persons authorised to preside at the sacrament of the Lord's Supper be permitted to lead celebrations of Holy Communion in which some or all worshippers gather through electronic means.

To celebrate the Eucharist (Communion) is to celebrate the redemptive work of Christ for all, including the world online.

#### **Services including online Communion:**

- Must limit participation to a common time (at the same time)
- Have permission from the superintendent
- Must be in the context of public worship

#### Some thoughts to reflect upon:

- During our time of worship, we are present to one another both electronically and in person all at the same time, sharing in worship to God.
- God is present with us as his gathered church wherever we are sharing in this time of worship together.
- The Good News of God's grace is shared through our time of worship.
- Jesus' presence is the bond between us wherever we are sharing together in worship at this moment.

#### How to prepare to share in online Communion:

- You would need to have bread and grape juice.
- Prepare (handle) the bread and grape juice reverently.
- Set aside just enough bread and grape juice to be consumed all at once.
- Give yourself totally to God by being fully present during worship.
- Wait until you are invited to share in the bread and grape juice together.

"It was an odd feeling, lining up against Great Britain. I used to dream that I might one day play for them; I had never thought that I would end up playing *against* them. But I had no time to dwell on the unexpected journey that had led me here, their puller raised the disc: the next point was about to start."

If you thought being a missionary meant wearing socks and sandals, living in the jungle, and having no phone or Internet, then think again. Levi Booth is not a stereotypical missionary. Not long out of Uni, Levi headed to Japan with his two essentials: his Bible and Frisbee. He was just a normal bloke with a passion for Ultimate Frisbee who stepped out boldly to tell people about Jesus. This is his journey to Asia: the ups, the downs, the adventures and playing for the Japanese national Ultimate Frisbee team. Levi's story might just cause you to consider how God could use *you and your gifts*, *talents and hobbies* – however unusual – to serve Him around the world. (*Parish Pump*)

#### **ADAM'S STORY**

## This is from SASRA's newsletter. "Soldier's, Airmen's Scripture Readers association"

They came and took a service at Trinity some years ago and I thought you would be encouraged by their work. They have also been busy supporting the troops who were deployed to Afghanistan to help with the evacuations the other month.

I want to share a recent experience with you, it's the story of a young soldier, called Adam (names have been changed).

Adam was recently at a low point in his life, his army career was not going well. His commanding officer had told him to think carefully about whether he still had anything to offer the army, and if not he would have to move on. Adam didn't know what to do, or how to get his life back on track. He was worried and upset; if he was discharged from the army he wouldn't be able to get another job, he would have let his family down, and he would have let the army and his friends in his unit down. He went to see the medical officer and was diagnosed with depression. As far as Adam was concerned his life was going from bad to worse and his thoughts took a darker turn towards suicide.

As a last resort Adam went looking for one of our Scripture Readers, John, who made him a cuppa and sat and listened to him. Over the weeks they got to know each other a little and Adam began to value John's opinion – he had been in combat, he knew what army life was all about. Adam started to go to group Bible studies that John was holding on the base, he started to focus again on his army career; and the suicidal thoughts stopped. One day the penny dropped for Adam and John was able to lead him in a profession of faith in Jesus as his Saviour.

Adam returned to his unit and has joined a local church, he is soldiering on. His commanding officer is amazed at the change in Adam and now sees him as a credit to his unit with a promising future ahead of him.

More than 20 young soldiers like Adam have made these life changing decisions so far this year as a result of the missionary work our Scripture Readers are doing.

### A Personal Account of the Very First Lockdown

Prior to 'Covid' I was always out and about, and busy most days, so the prospect of 'lockdown' seemed quite appealing at first, a bit like being given a holiday. During the first few weeks I tackled a cupboard which has always been untidy, (being the best place to keep the 'come in handy' bits and bobs that are kept forever but never reused), and my wardrobe too had a long-awaited review, resulting in many bags for the charity shops, once they are allowed to reopen.

Initially, I felt very guilty sitting down in the afternoon to watch a good film, but I soon overcame that by taking up knitting again. Knitting in front of the T.V. is something I am not terribly good at, but I persevered and eventually managed to complete a rather plain looking jumper.

One discovery I made while clearing out some cupboards was an old shoe box. It contained letters from an old friend of mine. She no longer writes long letters due to arthritis in her hands, but years ago she studied calligraphy, so her letters were always beautifully written.

I can't remember the last proper letter I wrote to a friend. Can you? These days I mostly keep in touch through e-mails, WhatsApp, texting, telephone, or writing notelets. Looking at that box of beautifully handwritten letters, I remember the excitement I felt at receiving them. She travelled extensively and her letters were always long, and interesting. I recall that I would make myself a drink and settle down in a comfy chair and simply savour reading her letters. With hindsight, I think it is a shame we seem to have lost the art of letter writing, which is a pity as it is always a joy to receive one.

So, friends, my resolution at the beginning of 2021, is to learn calligraphy and to write 'proper' letters to my friends. Their footprints are on our hearts. God bless you.




How amazing that Jonah didn't get it, after God had given him a second chance to fulfil the task that he had been set. God loved the people of Nineveh too.



# New Research Reveals Significant Contribution by Cathedrals to Local Economies

A new report has highlighted the hugely positive economic and social impact England's Cathedrals have on their cities. In 2019, England's 42 Anglican Cathedrals contributed £235m to their local economies. They provided 6,065 jobs, full-time equivalent jobs and volunteering posts for 15,400 people who gave 906,000 hours of their time. They welcomed more than 14.6 million visits, 308,000 by schoolchildren for educational events, and 9.5m from tourists. In the same year, Cathedrals hosted a rich programme of arts, music, heritage and culture – amounting to 9,580 events equivalent to two every three days – as well as providing the venues for film shoots such as *The Crown, Doctor Who* and *Avengers: Endgame*.

The Cathedrals have also run foodbanks, supported groups for the more vulnerable, the unemployed, and the homeless. They have helped outreach activities in schools, residential homes and hospitals, lunch clubs, parent and toddler groups, as well as community cafes. Also, over two-thirds of Cathedrals are part of the A Rocha Eco Church programme, helping the Church of England achieve its carbon reduction targets by 2030.

Today we're here to celebrate the life of Sylvia Wright, and to share our grief and sense of loss. And so today and in all the days and weeks that follow can I suggest you share memories of Sylvia? Treasure your best memories, your special memories of Sylvia whether as a mother, grandmother, great-grandmother, relative, friend, or in whatever way you knew her. Keep your memories of Sylvia. A wonderful Christian lady who was an inspiration to many throughout her life.



Friends, I've known Sylvia since 1994 and so there are a number of memories I could personally share. I remember her here at Christ Church faithfully running the Fellowship Group. Quietly organising each service, arranging a speaker, playing the piano and making sure everyone was okay and much, much, more. I also remember her wonderful voice especially when she read the bible in public. Her diction was so clear and you couldn't help but listen to the words because of the beautiful way Sylvia read the scriptures.

I also had the privilege of acting with Sylvia in a Passion Play called 'To Jerusalem' back in the Easter of 1999. I remember there was one scene where I had to ask Jim (Sylvia's husband) if he would give me his donkey so that I could take it to Jesus. At each performance Sylvia and I stood and worried each time....wondering if Jim would remember his lines! He'd fluffed them several times during rehearsals, but he got it right on the night much to the relief of Sylvia and me.

Talking of Jim... as his health deteriorated Sylvia was truly wonderful in the way that she cared for her husband. My Ruth reminded me of how Sylvia would tirelessly take Jim out for a drive in the car which was clearly something he enjoyed. Indeed, in her later years Sylvia would also enjoy simply being taken for a drive out in the car. Sylvia also loved looking at the birds and had a bird feeder in her garden in Chineham that brought her much joy.

But most importantly I'd like to highlight Sylvia's very strong and committed faith. Anyone who knew Sylvia would be aware of her quiet and assured faith in God. Even as her own physical and mental powers waned I'm sure she would have retained her hope in God. Be assured... as God's child Sylvia is in paradise right now. If we could only keep this before us, we would praise God more and more.

Most importantly she lived her faith out, quietly and humbly looking after many people. She'd often be in the background getting on with things as she consistently put others before herself. Friends, from everything I know about Sylvia I'm confident she understood that God is not dead. Rather He is ruling, moving, active, at work in this world, accomplishing His purposes.

So, as we mourn for Sylvia today and in the weeks and months ahead try to imagine Sylvia in heaven calling out to you and reminding you of these words that Jesus uttered as he walked on planet earth 2,000 years ago. 'Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God. Believe also in Jesus'. I'm sure Sylvia would tell you now... Jesus is coming back to take His followers to be with Him forever. Friends, ultimately Sylvia understood that to be with Jesus is better and more desirable than anything else in life and that's what Sylvia

would want for every single one of us! Friends, we can be confident that Sylvia recognised that by uniting her life with Jesus, she was united with God. She trusted in Jesus to show her the way throughout her life and at the end of it trusting Him to be with her through to eternity where Sylvia now is.

With all this in mind I'm pretty sure that throughout her life Sylvia looked to Jesus as the supreme example of what it means to love, recognising everything Jesus did in life and death was supremely loving. And I'm sure that's what Sylvia strived to do. Let's remind ourselves again... Sylvia was humble, and always helping in the background. She was someone who cared. She was compassionate, caring, selfless, thoughtful, modest, a beautiful reader, she had a strong faith, she always put others needs first. She always looked for the good in everyone. She always looked forward and saw the possibilities and opportunities at every stage of her life.

Friends, it's pretty clear.... Sylvia was filled with the love of Christ and sought to constantly help others. Sylvia loved you and many people and of course most of all she loved her family. Her children Richard, Peter and Deborah. Also her children-in-law, Liz and Karl and of course her grandchildren Scott, Naomi, Kristen and Lewis. And her Great grandchildren.... Abel, Nancy, Adah and Rafferty and especially her late husband, Jim who she is now reunited with. Friends, they were married in 1958 and remained married until Jim died in 2013. That' 55 years of marriage and is worth celebrating in its own right.

Friends, throughout her life Sylvia was someone who reached out and shared God's love. And of course that's good – because actually God has hard-wired us that way. Earlier Kristen read these words to us: "Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It is not rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails."

These aren't feelings, these are actions, behaviours. This is what love "looks like." And it's the way Sylvia showed her love. We're called to love the way God loves – directed outward towards others, not inward towards ourselves. It is utterly unselfish. And I think Sylvia has been a pretty good example of this.

Sylvia would want us to know God offers love to us throughout our lives and at the end of them, inviting us to turn to him and put our trust in him...Jesus died to show that nothing (not even death) is stronger than the love of God...his resurrection shows that nothing is stronger than the hope of God's love.

Today is quite naturally a tough day as we say a final farewell to Sylvia, but in the midst of our grief I pray you will find hope that one day we will be complete when we see God face to face. I pray this truth will strengthen you – we don't have all the answers now, but one day we will. Someday we will see Christ in person and be able to see with God's perspective. In the meantime be assured God has redeemed Sylvia and called her home and she now rests in peace with Him and will rise again in glory. Amen.

The Rt Revd & Rt Hon Dr John Sentamu, the former Archbishop of York, will be the next Chair of the board of International Development Agency Christian Aid. Dr Sentamu – who has been outspoken on issues of poverty and justice in the UK and globally for many years – served as the Archbishop of York from 2005 until 2020. He was created by Her Majesty the Queen, Baron of Lindisfarne in the County of Northumberland and Masooli in the Republic of Uganda. He is a member of the UK Parliament, in the House of Lords. Born in Kampala, Uganda, Dr Sentamu will be the first person of African descent to take up the position of Chair in Christian Aid's 75-year history.

Dr Rowan Williams, former Archbishop of Canterbury and current Chair, will stand down at Christian Aid's Annual General Meeting (AGM) in November, having served two full terms of office. Announcing the appointment, Christian Aid's CEO Amanda Khozi Mukwashi said: "This is wonderful news for Christian Aid. Dr Sentamu brings with him a passion and energy for global justice, a deep love of the Church and a profound theological understanding that will be able to speak into the crises of climate change, Covid, conflict and debt that are affecting the world's poorest communities. #### RECYCLING UPDATE

I am pleased to report that despite the Covid restrictions, the bin beside Sarum Hall is filling up nicely and I am emptying it twice weekly. Many thanks to all who are contributing. I have now put fresh posters on the bin showing the various collections. If you would like one to pass on to others or as a reminder for yourself, please get in touch with me. I can do A4 or A5 size. I have just had a lovely lot of recycling from Angela Smith's sister-in-law in from Manchester and I'll be picking up some bags from my sister in Yorkshire in a couple of months where she collects at her church. Then locally I have someone who collects from all their neighbours and then brings it up to the bin when they have about 400+ wrappers! So do spread the word. Currently we are collecting the following:

- Biscuit wrappers, both sweet and savoury varieties and cake wrappers. However, no sweet wrappers such as Mars, chocolate bars etc. It can be confusing as some biscuits such as Kit-Kat and Twix are often found with the sweets but are in fact classed as biscuits as they have a biscuit base.
- Baby food pouches and kids' yoghurt pouches as well as Ella's Kitchen snack wrappers. No other yoghurt pots are collected.
- Crisps of all varieties and any brand like Skips, Hoops, Wotsits, Doritos etc. We cannot collect peanuts, popcorn or pretzels though.
- Air, Home & Laundry care packaging. We could do with more of this. It includes the
  flexible packaging from dishwasher and detergent capsules / tablets; all brands of
  plastic air freshener containers, cartridge tops and car fresheners (but not electric
  plug-ins); flexible wipe packaging and tinted tubs for wipes used in home cleaning.
  (No baby wipes or cosmetic / facial wipes); tinted fabric conditioner bottles and their
  caps; Lenor tumble dryer sheets but not the box they come in.

All the recycling gets sent off in separate boxes according to type. Therefore, it is exceedingly helpful for when I come to sort it if all wrappers are put in *flat and unfolded* unless they are the big multi-pack wrappers. Sometimes wrappers have been folded into tiny triangles or tied into tight knots. This may save space in the bin but sadly they usually get discarded as trying to undo them is very time-consuming. Even screwed up packaging can take extra time to flatten. Fortunately, there is not much after sorting that I have to discard. I have some unusual deposits of cat food pouches, noodles and pasty / pie wrappers and Muller yoghurt wrappers fairly regularly but small in number compared to the rest of the recycling! If you hear of anyone who thinks we recycle those sort of items, do please set them straight.

In the last 12 months we have redeemed £110 from our collection which goes to Future Pillars for their work with vulnerable girls in Zambia. Do keep collecting.
